# Key Vocabulary

Christian	A follower of the teachings of Jesus.
Dr Barnardo	He worked tirelessly to help destitute, or poor, children in London, England, and set up the first home for boys in 1870.
Mother Teresa	Mother Teresa was a Catholic nun and missionary. She is famous for her charitable works and helping the poor, hungry and sick people of India.
Neighbour	Someone living next door to , or near to you.
Sukkah	A temporary hut constructed for use during the week-long Jewish festival of Sukkot. It is common for Jews to eat, sleep and otherwise spend time in the <b>sukkah</b> .
Sukkot	Sukkot commemorates the years that the Jews spent in the desert on their way to the Promised Land, and celebrates the way in which God protected them under difficult desert conditions.
Tzedehah	Tzedakah means 'charity'. It refers to the Jewish obligation, or mitzvah , of giving to charity as well as supporting social justice. Giving tzedakah is one of the most important commandments for Jews.

## Important people

**Mother Teresa**, ( August 26, 1910 — September 5, 1997), was a Catholic nun and a humanitarian. This means she did things to help out other people. Her entire life was fully devoted to helping the poor, the sick, the needy, and the helpless.



**Dr Thomas Barnardo**, July 4 1849—September 19, 1905, was a pioneer of social reform. He worked tirelessly to help destitute, or poor, children in London, England. He opened homes to help provide a better life for these children. The homes became "Dr. Barnardo's Homes."
